<p>It is Rachel's birthday. She thinks she will feel older, more mature, yet she is still feeling all the previous years still (10,9,8,7,6,.....). At school, Mrs. Price, Rachel's teacher, insists that an ugly, smelly red sweater is Rachel's sweater. Rachel tries to say it is not hers, but cannot get the words out. Even a classmate says she thinks the awful red sweater belongs to Rachel. After many attempts of trying to show the sweater is not hers, Mrs. Prices tells Rachel to stop being ridiculous and put the sweater on. Rachel cannot hold back her frustration and bursts into tears, letting her previous ages show. After Rachel shows her emotion, another student realizes that the sweater belongs to her not Rachel. Rachel is embarrassed and wishes she wasn't eleven and could just fly away like a balloon.</p>

Prior Knowledge Demands		Language Features	
<p>Students should have knowledge of being excited for a day, but their expectations not meeting the reality of the situation. There is a mix of abstract and concrete ideas throughout the text. Overall experiences displayed in text should be common to the reader.</p>		<p>Largely explicit and easy to understand with some figurative language. ("Because when you grow old is kind of like an onion or like rings inside a tree trunk or like my little wooden dolls that fit one inside the other, each year inside the next one.") Dialogue and description will help students to grasp the tone of the piece.</p>	
Potential Reader/Task Challenges			
<p>This short story is very engaging for students because they will be able to connect to conflict presented, which assist them in providing character traits that would describe Rachel and Mrs. Price. Students may have difficulty explaining why the author included certain figurative language or description and how it adds to the meaning of the text.</p>			
Big Takeaway			
<p>Students will be able to identify the sequence of events in the story and explain how the main character responds to the events (especially the main conflict).</p>
